I don't know yet what specific field I would like to go into once I graduate, but I know that I love geology and I'm sure that my specific career goals will become more clear to me as I finish more of my degree.

Receiving this award has not only helped me financially this year, but it has impacted me personally. I find it really touching that the Ore Gangue alumni care so much about



the current students at the university. It really made me appreciate how much of a history the Ore Gangue has, and I can only hope that when I'm an alumna I can have this kind of a connection to future students as well! Thank you so much for giving me this bursary, it means a lot!

My interest in geology started when I was just a little kid. My grandparents had a cabin out at Lake Diefenbaker and I remember spending hours walking up and down the shores collecting rocks and fossils. My grandma, who was also a rock collector, taught me how to look for petrified wood, and I have been obsessively collecting it ever since. Looking back, spending that time there with my grandma is what really sparked my interest in geology, and I'm so grateful that she shared her love of rocks with me.

My favourite U of S memory so far was the first beer night the Ore Gangue hosted this year. Due to some complications, we were not allowed to throw any in lounges at the beginning of the year, so this beer night (hosted at the Hose and Hydrant) was our first party of the year. 

My goal is to work in the mineral exploration industry. I would like to find gold deposits in the future and work my way up to upper-level management. I plan to take the online Canadian Securities Course to assist my professional development.

This generous bursary was extremely beneficial. I work every summer to save up money for the upcoming school year and support my family. I took three courses this semester and the bursary funded the majority of my tuition. I am very grateful to be a recipient of this award.



My work experience in the mineral exploration industry first started at a conference in Toronto. I was sitting on a couch waiting for my friend, when a man approached me and asked if I wanted to hear some advice. He told me to never complain while working, because nobody wants to hear a complainer. The conversation continued and naturally I asked him if he had any work for me during the summer. He told me to show up to his office in Whitehorse with two pairs of boots and a pair of coveralls and he would give me work. I asked if I could send him an email or call before coming, and he said, "Nope, just show up and we will give you work." I was very skeptical to go, but I also understood that this opportunity was very rare. I decided to take the risk and booked a one-way flight to Whitehorse and showed up at his office. He was very surprised to see me and said he didn't think I would show up.

That summer, I worked as a diamond drill helper in multiple remote locations across the Yukon. It turned out to be a very rewarding experience and I had the opportunity to make some very valuable connections in the industry. The work itself was very physically and mentally demanding, but I knew it was worth it in the long run. The next summer I contacted the camp manager for one of the camps I was staying at while I was a diamond drill helper and told them I was looking for work as a geology summer student. They were generous enough to offer me a summer contract as a geotechnical assistant. I was very grateful to have that opportunity, as they would generally hire locals to work for them in Dawson City. Now that I have graduated, I am very excited for what the future has to offer and all of the experiences I will have.

My favourite U of S memory was receiving this bursary! Although the U of S has many great offerings, this one is my favourite and I feel honoured to be chosen for the award, as it is my first and only bursary received during my undergrad.

As a recipient I can genuinely say that this award helps so much with the financial burden associated with being a student. It's hard to keep up with classes, and even harder to make financial ends meet. This award greatly reduces the stress associated with meeting financial demands for university education.

Thank you very much for the donation. I hope that in the future I will be able to give back to students that are in my position right now. I was the vice-president of Ore Gangue for 2018/19 and I will forever be associated with Ore Gangue.
